

From the Rabbi



It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair, we had everything before us, we had nothing before us...

This famous passage from the novel "A Tale of Two Cities" by Charles Dickens in a profound way captures the reality in the life of our congregation. On the one hand, from day to day and week to week life within our congregation is vibrant and exciting. Members of our congregation are getting together on a regular basis to learn, to pray, to develop and nurture relationships with one another, to strengthen our connection to Israel and the Jewish People, to participate in the process of tikkun olam, making the world a better place, and to benefit from the wisdom and guidance of our Jewish heritage. We can all take great pride in the quality of our programs and services that are meaningful, relevant and well attended. In recent months, I have been moved on many occasions to say, "Conservative Judaism is alive and well in North East Queens and Western Nassau County."

On the other hand, we are feeling the pain of the change in demographics that has forced us to close our Religious School. We are in the process of entering into a partnership with Temple Israel of Great Neck where the nine students: 1 kindergartener, 1 first grader, 1 third grader, 2 fourth graders, 1 fifth grader and 3 sixth graders will continue their Jewish education in the fall. Our students and their families will continue to meet with me on a monthly basis for family programming and our children will continue to participate on a regular basis in our Shabbat Morning Services. In this way our children will benefit from a strong and dynamic Hebrew School experience with other children from the community while maintaining their connection to our synagogue and its special place in their lives. We are also in the process of developing compelling opportunities to further develop and nurture the Jewish identity of the 50 to 60 post B'nai Mitzvah teens of our congregation. This month on Friday, June 13, Cantor Shron and I will be hosting a Shabbat Dinner for our Teens that will include interactive games and discussions. Reaching out to our teens and their families will be one of the top priorities as we plan for the year 5775.

In addition to the reality of our demographics, another challenge that our congregation is facing is the lack of young leadership with our congregation. Both Steve Aronowitz and Bob Stern have been presidents for more six years and there is no one who is in line to be our next president. Our board has been in the mode of maintaining our synagogue, but it is time for our leadership to become a visionary leadership and to build upon the amazing strength and potential that lies within our congregation so that we can strengthen and nurture the Jewish identity and Jewish life of the members of our community. We are currently applying to the United Synagogue for participation in the program, Sulam for Emerging Leaders. This program is designed to reach out to younger members of the community who have not yet stepped up to leadership positions to engage them in significant Jewish learning and Jewish experiences that will lead to a heightened interest in making Judaism and Jewish Life a priority. If you think you might be interested in participating in this program, please contact the synagogue office and let us know. We also hope to participate in a new program that United Synagogue is offering: Sulam for Current Leaders. This program will help those who have already taken leadership positions within the synagogue to be come more effective and rise to higher positions of leadership.

This edition of Temple Talk is full of great opportunities to connect with God, Torah and Jewish people. Please take the time to take a look at all that is happening and make the choice to be a part of it. I look forward to learning and experiencing the blessings of life together with the congregation as we begin this month of June.

CONGREGATION HOSTS COMMUNITY INTERFAITH SERVICE



If you didn't wake up early on Memorial Day, you missed a great start to the holiday as we hosted the 32nd annual Little Neck – Douglaston Interfaith Memorial Day Service. Pausing from the day's festivities to remember those who gave their lives for our country is, of course, meaningful. Standing together with community members from local houses of worship is particularly significant as it is the first time that our temple has participated in this service.

The idea to be the host religious center came about in an informal conversation with organizers two years ago. Attending the holiday service at St. Anastasia Roman Catholic Church, Rabbi Yaffe and I spoke with officials and expressed interest in having Oakland Little Neck Jewish Center become part of the annual program. On a brilliantly clear Monday morning, an outpouring of community members celebrated an important bond with those brave men, and women, who have given their lives in our nation's service.

"The best part of being at the temple is making so many friends," Harriet reflected. And, for the past 13 years, it has been with Harriet as the greeter. For me – and for so many others – that has been the best part of having Harriet behind the front desk.

Lenny and I would like to thank Donald Forman and the Israel Bond Committee for selecting us for this prestigious award.

We also want to thank Cantor Josh Shron, Co-Presidents Steve Aronowitz and Bob Stern, Rabbi Yaffe and Rabbi Eckstein and Lois and Stanley Wirthem for providing a delicious breakfast. We would like to welcome my parents, Gladys and George Warhit, our children David, Hillary, and Melissa and our close friends and family who have traveled from Boston, Connecticut, Westchester, New Jersey, Manhattan, Floral Park, Manhasset Hills and Great Neck to celebrate with us today. We also want to thank the members of our temple family for their acknowledgement and support.

On December 20, 2011, 6 of us from Little Neck Jewish Center and 5 from Oakland Jewish Center got together to discuss our future, forming the Consolidation Committee. 2 years later after countless meetings, lasting endless hours and extensive Judicial proceedings, we became one Congregation, L'Dor V' Dor. With great pride we stand here today as one congregation in support of Israel!

Almost one year ago, 15 of us, led by Rabbi Yaffe traveled to Israel. We explored, discovered, experienced and immersed ourselves in the culture, beauty and wonderment of Israel. While in Tel Aviv at the Hall of Independence, we learned that the meeting during which the State of Israel declared its independence, took 35 minutes on a Friday afternoon, before Shabbat." We could learn a lot from that! "While at the Ayalon Institute in Rehovot, we learned that the concrete building which housed the secret underground ammunition factory that supplied all the ammunition for the War of Independence was built in no more than 3 weeks. Hopefully we will keep this in mind as we undertake our renovation projects!

Although many of us had been to Israel before, our trip was an in-depth experience as we met individuals who made a difference in the lives of others expressed through their passion, love, hope and enthusiasm for Israel. We met leaders in Cancer Research, Medicine and Advanced Technology. We met a woman who opened her home and hearts to us as she told us of the murder of her 17 year old son by a terrorist. How do you go on after that? Through the eyes of her young child she wrote a book, helping others deal with the loss of a loved one while keeping her family intact and strong. We met many people who made Aliyah to Israel, creating new communities which offered spiritual and cultural growth, sharing a vision for the future.

One can't imagine what this county is like if your haven't been there. The land which was once barren is plentiful, rich with vegetable fields, advanced irrigation systems, sprawling villages and cities. Whether it's eating and drinking at an outdoor cafe in the cosmopolitan city of Tel Aviv, wandering through cobblestone streets filled with art galleries in Zefat, exploring the underground tunnels of Jerusalem, taking a jeep ride in the Golan Heights, floating in the Dead Sea, climbing Masada, or singing and dancing at the Kotel on Shabbat with thousands of people, we all felt comfortable and safe, felt like we had come home. "When no country wants us or needs us, Israel is there for us".

For the 15 of us who traveled through Israel last year, we started out as acquaintances and became friends, sharing a bond which will always be remembered, strengthened by our love for Israel.

So, in our honor, please help us to support Israel's financial stability and endless opportunities for growth by purchasing an Israel bond and visiting Israel. I guarantee you will feel a sense of community and belonging.

A Message from Cantor Joshua Shron

Dear Ben, Brianna, Brandon, Dani, Danielle, Danny, Ellie, Emily, Ethan, Melanie, Noah, Rachel, Samantha and Scott,

Well, here you are. Getting ready to graduate from our Religious School. You've learned from countless teachers, two rabbis, at least three school principals...but only one cantor since you began your formal Jewish education with Morah Etty in the Alef Class. See, your class is pretty special to me. You began in our Alef class in 2009, the same year I began as cantor of what was once known as Little Neck Jewish Center. As I watched you learn and grow over the past five years, I had the privilege to get to know each of you and your families. For many of you, I've helped one of your older siblings prepare to become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah...as you looked up at your older brother or sister with admiration, knowing that one day, your time would come too.

Well, for many of you, your time DID come this past school year. And you were amazing! We talked, laughed, sometimes cried...while you worked incredibly hard. Studying every day, Skyping with me late at night, getting annoyed at me when I told you that you needed to work harder, learning Torah portions and Haftarat, writing speeches, learning to lead services, studying with the rabbi...and accomplishing so much more than you ever thought possible. You took the tools you were provided, the Jewish education your parents gave to you as a gift, and used it as a starting point to help you accomplish what you once thought impossible. And you made your family and community very, very proud.

It won't be the last time you do that. Judaism is not just something we do to get ready for a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Have you ever heard someone say "a Bar/Bat Mitzvah is not the end, but only the beginning"? (That's something they teach you to say in Rabbinical / Cantorial School.) Do you understand what that really means? It means that, even though your early Jewish education is ending, your quest to learn what it means to be a Jew is just beginning. It means that it's time to try to understand the JOY of being Jewish. It means that you keep going to services, reading Hebrew, observing Shabbat, eating kosher food and learning about our heritage for the rest of your life. No, not because your parents are forcing you, not to get ready to "perform" at a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, not to make someone else happy. You need to do these things for YOU...because I promise, one day soon you will realize the rewards of living a Jewish life.

You should know that your synagogue is working hard to build a GREAT program for the teenagers of our community. From USY events to Shabbat dinners, from "Conversations with the Cantor" to social events, from fun trips to educational opportunities...we plan to do our best to keep you guys coming back as often as possible. As you complete middle school and enter high school over the next few years, remember that your involvement in the Jewish community is just getting started.

Religious School News

Dear Friends,

After three wonderful years as your Educational Director, I am sitting down to write my final formal Temple Talk article. I have accepted a position as the Director of Education at another synagogue and will begin working there on July 1. Next month's Temple Talk will contain some thoughts on my time here. This month, I want to focus on the fantastic school year that is coming to an end.

We were thrilled to add a new Kindergarten class, and two excellent new teachers, Charlotte Schneider (Kindergarten) and Judy Rosenfeld (Hey), who quickly became beloved members of our Religious School family. In our continuing effort to provide our kids with the most meaningful and engaging educational experience possible, the Aleph-Gimel students used CDs in class to complement their Hebrew textbook studies. Our new, original Judaic curriculum consisted of nine units, each of which featured text study, games and other interactive activities and fun, experiential "specials" that contained significant Jewish content. For my two favorite "specials", we toured the Ronald McDonald House in New Hyde Park, baked dessert for its guests and made get well cards for its guests' children (Tzedakah and Gemilut Chasadim unit), and visited Stop & Shop for a scavenger hunt related to kashrut (Food unit). The Hey class curriculum was also totally re-imagined; it explored topical themes, through a Jewish lens, and focused upon the relevance of our tradition to our students' lives. One night, parents joined us to study Torah and to learn about ethical wills with their children.

Due to its success, last year's Shabbat participation program, geared initially to the Daled and Hey students, was expanded to include the Aleph-Gimel students. We also offered a variety of exciting special Sunday programs, such as a Lower East Side Scavenger Hunt and a special Bar/Bat Mitzvah program at the magnificent Eldridge Street Synagogue (Hey families); Bowling for Tzedakah (Hey class), which resulted in over \$1,500.00 in donations from students' sponsors and Sunday morning minyan members, to Masbia, a Jewish soup kitchen set up like a restaurant to ensure patrons' dignity; a trip to the Jewish Children's Museum in Brooklyn, and a Mitzvah Morning at Alley Pond Park, both open to the entire school.

Some holiday highlights included: family Sukkah decorating; a Drum Circle in the Sukkah; latke making; a Family Chanukah Dinner and Candle Lighting, made even more special by a family art project; a trip to Manhattan to see the lighting of the world's largest menorah; hamentaschen baking, Pack it Up for Purim, student Purim videos shown during the Megillah reading; a Passover Model Seder led by the kids themselves; and Israeli Monopoly.





Israel On Our Minds

Yom HaZikaron & Yom Ha'Atzmaut Review

On Monday, May 5th, we observed Yom HaZikaron and celebrated Yom Ha'Atzmaut at the Synagogue. We began the evening with Mincha services, during which we had a memorial for the lives of the Israelis lost in wars and in terrorist attacks throughout its 66 year history. After services, we showed two films for the occasion. The first was a film describing how the Israeli air force began in 1948. It started with 4 American World War II fighter pilots and 4 German planes found in Czechoslovakia. The four men flew untested planes against the Arab countries that attacked in 1948 during the War of Independence. Luckily they all flew, although the pilots were skeptical. The second film was on a sadder note. It was called One Family. It was a documentary of a memorial in Israel by many families that lost loved ones, either soldiers or civilians in terrorist attacks. Although it was somber, it was uplifting in describing how the families have been able to live on, but always remembering their loved ones.



Once that part of the program was completed, everyone moved into the ballroom to enjoy a fabulous Israeli dinner. We had falafel and all the Israeli salads available. It was sumptuous. We were then honored to enjoy a discussion by Shahar Azani, Consul for Media Affairs for the Consulate of Israel in New York. He spent the first 15 minutes giving a speech that would be done by a Palestinian arguing for his cause to occupy the land of Israel. This took everyone for surprise and they could not understand how we could provide a program like that. After he got everyone's anger up, he introduced himself and spent the next two hours explaining the problems that Israel's public relations are having and how he has tried to educate both college students and adults with regard to the misinformation promulgated by the Palestinian supporters. It was a wonderful evening and we all learned a great deal.

Yom Hashoah 5774 Review

On Sunday, April 27, the members of Congregation L'Dor V'Dor, Marathon Jewish Center and Temple Torah gathered together to observe Yom Hashoah. We honored the memory of those who perished in the Holocaust and rededicated ourselves to making sure that lessons learned from the past will have an impact upon the present and future of our world. Our Guest Speaker, Sonia Hochman, member of our community, featured with her family in the documentary "No Place On Earth", was interviewed by the teens of our local BBYO youth group.

We watched a powerful video, "How Do We Respond?" narrated by Chloe Valdery for the Pro-Israel Festival in New Orleans. She discussed over a timeline, the disturbing increase of anti-Semitism, the BDS Movement, and the denial of the Holocaust as it was articulated on Diversity Day at the University of New Orleans.

We were deeply moved as children entered the sanctuary with solemn faces bearing posters with names of concentration camps. In honor of the six million of our brothers and sisters who perished, six candles were lit by Holocaust survivors as we learned about their stories. The memorial prayer and Kaddish were recited. The observance concluded with a celebration of the modern state of Israel, as the youth led us in Yerushalayim Shel Zahav (Jerusalem of Gold). All who attended were provided with a bio of one who perished in the Holocaust and a Yahrzeit candle to be lit as a way of enabling his or her soul to continue to shine in this world.
