From the Rabbi

Last month, in this column, I reprinted a speech that was delivered by Simon Deng a former Sudanese slave, who made an impassioned speech before the Durban III conference of the United Nations General Assembly meeting on September 22, 2011. The theme of the conference was supposed to be "victims"



September 22, 2011. The theme of the conference was supposed to be "victims of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance: recognition, justice and development". Most of the member states of the UN attended. The previous Durban conferences had been criticized by Western governments for allegedly promoting rather than combating racism. Australia, Austria, Bulgaria, Canada, the Czech Republic, France, Germany, Israel, Italy, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Poland, the United Kingdom and the United States all boycotted Durban III. They charged that the Durban process had been used to promote racism intolerance, anti-Semitism and Holocaust denial, and to erode freedom of speech and Israel's right to exist.

When Simon Deng gave his speech he did so as a friend and supporter of Israel. He expressed his gratitude for all that Israel was able to do for him and he attempted to counter and silence the racist claims that are central to discourse at the UN.

In the years since Simon gave his truthful, powerful and courageous speech for all at the UN General Assembly and indeed, for all of the world to hear, many things have changed. His speech was and still is important and it should continue to be a source of pride. However, it was suggested to me that if Simon Deng were to give a speech today, it would be different.

In trying to handle the difficult reality of some 53,000 African asylum seekers who have made their way to Israel, Israel, in the eyes of some, has been less than hospitable and is not responding to this situation in a way that is in keeping with the Jewish value of "being kind to the stranger in our midst." A wall has been erected to keep more asylum seekers from infiltrating into Israel and those who are in Israel are being arrested and are being forced to live in an "open" detention center in the Negev.

In so many areas of life, Israel is indeed a light unto the nations. We can and should be extremely proud of all that Israel contributes to the well being of its citizens, Arab and Jew alike, as well as to the world at large. There are, however, some areas in which Israel could do better, just like any other nation of the world, including ours. As advocates for Israel, when we know of something that Israel is doing of which we are not proud, it is not out of place to get involved with an effort to promote social justice within Israel which is our homeland and in a very real way represents all of us as Jews.

T'ruah, an organization of rabbis from all streams of Judaism that acts on the Jewish imperative to respect and protect the human rights of all people has taken up the cause of the African asylum seekers who are currently under Israeli rule. The goals of T'ruah in regard to this issue are to:

End the indefinite detention of asylum seekers under the Anti-Infiltration Law.

Create a functional, fair, and transparent refugee status determination procedure that allows for each individual to apply for asylum in lines with international standards adhered to by other Western democracies.

Stop deportations and coerced self-deportation of Eritrean and Sudanese asylum seekers.

Quell xenophobic rhetoric hostile to the Africans.

Provide asylum seekers access to health care, social services, and the opportunity to work until their final status, or destination, can be fairly determined.

On the Truah website, there is a call to action which includes writing to Prime Minister Netanyahu and Michael Oren, the Israeli Ambassador to the US. The sample letter that is suggested is:

Since June 2012, all African asylum seekers arriving in Israel have been automatically incarcerated for a minimum of three years without even a trial. Detainees include those previously trafficked, raped and tortured in the Egyptian Sinai. Israel is the destination country and not responsible for abuse suffered prior to entry, but it nevertheless has obligations as to how it treats these people once they arrive.

There are serious problems with the current system of dealing with victims of torture and trafficking in detention centers including a lack of identification of victims of trafficking, a lack of sufficient shelter space, and insufficient access to medical rehabilitation.

I am deeply saddened to hear that victims of human trafficking and torture are placed in detention upon entering Israel's borders. I strongly urge the Israeli government to quickly discontinue its policy of detaining victims of trafficking and torture.

Holocaust Remembrance at the United Nations by Elane Berk

On Monday, January 27, a small group of us from the synagogue attended the Holocaust Remembrance at the United Nations. It was an inspirational experience, with music by the 92nd Street Y's woodwind quartet.

The speakers, which included John Ashe (president of the United Nations General Assembly), Ron Prosor (Israeli representative to the UN), Samantha Power (U.S. representative to the UN) and Rene Finder (Holocaust Survivor), spoke of the importance of remembrance and action for the future of our world.

Steven Spielberg was the keynote speaker. He spoke of his Shoah Foundation established to collect and preserve testimonies of survivors. 52,000 testimonies-32 languages. He told how it took 20 years of directing before he felt ready for a film such as Schindler's List, Ruth Finder was on the list. She spoke of the work she does with the youth of today. Her goal is to encourage them to take an active part and not to be indifferent to the injustices they see around them.

Four students from the Bronx High School of Science described how their school has its own Holocaust memorial museum used by students and faculty to further the importance of remembrance and action. The quote of the day was by Albert Einstein "The world will not be destroyed by those who do evil but by those who watch them without doing anything"

Canter Shmuel Barzilai from Vienna concluded the ceremonies with his stirring renditions of El Maleh Rachamin and Ani Ma'amin.

Unplug to Reconnect by Morah Ellen Charlop

Currently, in Hebrew School, we are studying the Shabbat Pod. The children are learning that Shabbat is more than just a day of rest, it's a day to unplug (if you can), clear your calendar and your thoughts, in order to reconnect with each other and with Hashem. We are learning to understand our love for Shabbat and the role it plays in preserving the Jewish people, by living, smelling and tasting the Shabbat experience.

Here are some interpretive answers to the insightful questions that your kids are asking:

But where did G-d come from? *G_d is not like any other concept and is so metimes difficult to understand. Sometimes it's difficult to put your mind around such a concept as Infinity. Is G-d everywhere and everything? Is G-d One? The answer to both questions is yes! This is not so easy to digest. It takes years of thought and study. Think of G-d as a Power or Energy of holiness and goodness which is neither created nor destroyed. He was, He is, He will always be. You need to chew on that for a while.*

Can you read the whole Torah in one day? The Torah is not like any other book. It is not meant to merely be read, but to be pondered, internalized and questioned, and interpreted on so many different levels. Can the Torah be read in one day? It depends how you define the word read.

Why Passover now? Perhaps the message of the Torah is to start preparing now, both physically and spiritually. This holiday is a doozy on so many levels, from cleaning the house, to cleaning up our spiritual acts. It's saying, pack up and get ready for a journey out of Mizrayim (Egypt). This requires patience, persistence and introspection. I guess we better start now!

I want to thank Rabbi Yaffe for discussing with me meaningful ways of answering these questions.

Your children continue to ask:

What do you do if to save your own life, someone else must lose theirs?

Why aren't insects Kosher?

Why are Jews the minority?

Wasn't Jesus Jewish?

What do the names of the Hebrew months mean?

Israel On Our Minds

Israel Joins CERN By Judy Samuels


CERN is the European Organization for Nuclear Research. According to Aryeh Savit, of the Tazpit News Agency, following a unanimously adopted resolution at the 169th session of the CERN council, Israel was admitted on January 15, 2014 as a full member of the organization. A special ceremony was held in Geneva and the end of which the Israeli flag was added to the line of flags representing the Member States of the organization. Israel was admitted as the 21st Member State, the first new Member since 1999.

Israeli scientists will now participate in a range of projects including scientific, research, industrial and educational activities of CERN. Foreign Minister Lieberman stated at the event, "We are proud that Israel creates more than 1% of the scientific knowledge in the world, even though our population is only one thousandth of the world's population. Israel goal, and the international community's task, is to ensure that science and technology should be used for progress, growth and saving lives."

This is quite a difference from the BDS movement and the American Studies Association's boycott of Israeli academic institutions. Thankfully, CERN understands the need to share all technology and scientific research for progress and hopefully world peace.

On a more unfortunate note, UNESCO, the UN's cultural agency is delaying for six months an exhibit on Jewish connections to the Holy Land after objections from Arab countries. The exhibition is called "People, Book, Land – The 3,500 Year Relationship of the Jewish People to the Holy Land," was scheduled to open in January at UNESCO's headquarters in Paris. The delay is due to 22 Arab member states indicated that this exhibit could disrupt the Israeli-Palestinian peace negotiations. The UN agency said it needed extra time to revise "unresolved issues relating to potentially contestable textual and visual historical points" that member states could perceive as "endangering the peace process."

The exhibit is to show 30 illustrated panels showing the long history of the Jewish people in the Holy Land, from the days of the biblical patriarch Abraham to modern Israel as a high-tech powerhouse. US, Israeli, and Canadian officials' had all been active in efforts to save the exhibit.
